The Hub, an agency of Larimer County, serves youth aged 10 to 18 who are facing the following issues: delinquent behavior, non-detainable offenses, mental health emergencies, drug and alcohol abuse, youth beyond control of their parents, parent/child conflicts, runaways, and truancy. The Hub provides on-site services including, detention screening, individual and family counseling and multi-disciplinary staffing.

Adolescents are referred by the Larimer County Department of Human Services probation and/or corrections. Turning Point is accredited by the Colorado Department of Education and licensed by the Colorado Department of Human Services and Department of Public Health, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division. Youth as young as 10 years old may be served depending on their needs.
